

## **Examination cell report 2016-17**

The College established an Examination Cell to take charge of the examination system in the college. The detailed syllabi, course outcomes, programme specific outcomes and programme outcomes are made available in the college website and college library. Orientation is given to the newly admitted batch of students and their parents regarding the system, process, methods and techniques of assessment and evaluation. The learning outcomes of all courses are also communicated to the students during the orientation programme. Institution notifies the faculty and students about course, syllabus updates evaluation process, examination rules and regulations etc. through college hand book. The examination schedule for the academic year prepared and displayed in web site and notice board.

New academic programmes initiated (UG and PG): One UG BSc. Programme started with Maths, Statistics and Computer Science combination. 8 Skill orientation programmes have been initiated during the year 2016-17.

Innovations in curricular design and transaction: Syllabus is regularly updated through Board of Studies and Academic Council. Major changes in syllabus have been made in the following papers to meet stakeholder demands.

1. As per the guidelines of UGC, APSCHE and Andhra University, the syllabi of the common subjects in BA, BSc, BCom, BSc.(HSc.) and BBA from I to VI semesters were reviewed and modified for the implementation of new CBCS.
2. The review was intended to rectify mistakes and to reduce the excess load, if any, in case of core papers. Further, Syllabi for all the papers from I to V semesters and Electives in various subjects for VI semester were also prepared.
3. All the departments except Journalism, Political science, Biotechnology, II<sup>nd</sup> Languages, and Physics, offers cluster electives in VI semester.
4. Regarding the Electives of core papers VII and VIII (in the VI Semester), the following guidelines are followed.
  - Core Papers VII and VIII will be Electives for any domain subject and both the papers will be offered in the same VI Semester of the final year.
  - At Paper -VII, a student will pursue three Electives respectively belonging to the three domain subjects. For example, an MPC student will study one each Elective from Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry as individual Elective paper VII. He/she will choose from the multiple individual Electives offered for each subject.

- Whereas, as Paper -VIII, the student will study all the three papers as a cluster from the same subject (one of the three subjects). These three papers will cover a wide stream and will give a wider learning experience to the students. For example, as Paper -VIII, an MPC student will pursue all the three papers belonging to Physics (VIII-A-1,2&3 or VIII-B-1,2&3 or....) from out of alternate Clusters of Electives of Physics and will not study Mathematics and Chemistry. Each Cluster will have at least two Electives.
  - The Electives of VI Semester will be treated as 'specialisation' and the title of the 'stream' will be mentioned in the provisional pass certificate of BA/BCom/BSc/BBA students.
5. General English and II<sup>nd</sup> Language Departments Telugu, Hindi, French and Sanskrit reviewed their syllabus and offers only from I to III semesters. New syllabus introduced by Sanskrit for III semester.
6. Regarding General Education courses
- I Semester: No change (Human Values and Professional Ethics & Communication and Soft skills-I)
- II Semester: Communication and Soft skills- II no change and Citizenship education paper now replaced by Leadership education
- III Semester: Human Ecology – I/II & Computer Skills-III / Computer Literacy-III papers now replaced with Information and Communication Technology- I and Environmental Science/Analytical skills.
- IV Semester: Human Ecology – I/II, Interdisciplinary electives, General English and II<sup>nd</sup> Language are now replaced with Information and Communication Technology- II, Communication and Soft skills- III, Environmental Science/Analytical skills and Entrepreneurship education.
7. Eight skill development courses started this year. Telugu DTP by Telugu Department, Web Designing using HTML by Computer Science department, Medical lab Technology by Biochemistry department, E-Filling by Commerce department, Stenography by Office Management department, Conflict Management and Negotiation skills, Blouse making and Chudidhar set making by Home science department, Beautician course by Mathematics department.

**Examination Report:** Mid semester examinations conducted for I, III & V semesters in the month of July/August and for II, IV & VI semesters in the month of December. End semester examinations conducted for I, III & V semesters in the month of October and for II, IV & VI

semesters in the month of March. Nearly 236 question papers prepared with the help of paper setters from colleges of different states for end semester examinations and the number of papers valued were 19454 with the help of nearly 236 examiners from different colleges. Odd semester results declared within 29 days and even semester within 12 days.

College implemented Degree Examination and result system (DEAR system) version 1.5.4. in the examination cell for the management of result processing till 2014-15. For speedy and quick declaration of results and to implement new UGC guidelines, updated version of software implemented from the academic year 2015-16 in the examination cell.

**Advantages of New version-** Payment gateway is available in the website for the payment of various fees online by the students to make the registrations online for various services. The EMS is enabling the student to download the hall tickets and view results online. Online examinations can be conducted with the help of new software. After completion of the examination students will get the result immediately. EMS helps in the pre and post examination activities such as monitoring of examination fee payment, examination schedule, seating arrangement, attendance monitoring, option to select new Programmes and Courses offered, Complete student data entry like Photo, Aadhar number, caste, parents names etc, Option to edit the data, generate forms like Attendance sheets, Mid semester mark sheets, Supplementary students list, Semester wise mark sheets, Results, Statistics, Ranks list, Cumulative mark sheets, consolidated statements, Provisional certificates, high-tech degree data etc.

We received 11 applications for revaluation of End semester papers. Out of which marks changed for 8. There are 6 students involved in malpractice in this academic year. Some departments prepared question banks for MCQs to conduct online accessory assessment tests.

**Results:** Results and statistics of results prepared and presented to Examination Committee, Academic council and Governing body.

In Odd semester (I, III, V) the examination committee members reviewed the performance of students in various subjects and found it to be satisfactory in majority of the subjects, while the performance in some papers needs improvement. The result of V end semester was found to be better in all groups except MEC & MPC. In III semester result found to be good compared to last year. The overall pass percentage is good for I semester. It was resolved that the minimum attendance required to be eligible to appear for the end semester exams of II, IV and VI semesters in March 2017 be 40%. Any student whose attendance falls short of 40%

for the semester will not be eligible to write the end semester exams. The same student may appear for supplementary exams, if she has any backlog.

In even semester (II, IV, VI) the examination committee members reviewed the performance of students in various subjects and found it to be satisfactory in majority of the subjects, while the performance in literary appreciation and Practical criticism needs improvement in VI semester. Members suggested arranging special classes for the students in that subject before instant exams. In IV semester The HEP pass was low as they failed in Foundation course Communication and soft skills. It was suggested to take remedial classes before the next exams. In II semester performance of Chemistry and statistics papers should improve. Resolved to conduct accessory examination in online mode. Dr. K. Sujatha nominated by principal as assistant controller of examinations in place of Dr. P. Bhushanavathi.

**Examination reforms implemented:**

1. Greater flexibility in continuous assessment & Innovative accessory assessment methods provided opportunity to test the various skills of the student rather than conventional testing
2. Awarding extra credits to special achievers in NCC, NSS, Sports and national level events made them to feel unique when compared to others.
3. Initiative of holding the Instant exam in April for students who fail in not more than two papers over six semesters is to facilitate the progression of students to Higher Education courses and placement in companies with less inconvenience.
4. The College strictly adheres to the declared examination schedules. This facilitated to

declare results in time and also the progression of students to Higher Education courses and placement in companies with less inconvenience.

5. The average time taken by the College for declaring the examination results is two to three weeks, to ensure that the students do not miss any opportunity in their professional career and higher studies.

6. Two Senior Faculty members are designated as Observers/ Squad to monitor the conduct of the exams each day to facilitate smooth conduct of examinations and also to avoid malpractice.

7. Transparency in evaluation (students verify their Mid semester answer scripts). Provision for Revaluation of End semester answer scripts on students request provides an opportunity to students to express their grievances regarding evaluation.

8. Apart from the regular examinations, special supplementary of V semester papers for final year students are conducted immediately after declaration of the results in January helps the students to clear their backlogs without losing a year.

9. Implementation of CBCS, Students will have freedom to choose courses from a pool suggested by the departments

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
