OBJECTIVE : To enable the students to develop communication skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing.

COURSE : Three components

a. Intensive Reading

b. Extensive Reading

c. Communication Skills – i. Writing ii. Verbal

a. INTENSIVE READING :

The Intensive Reading programme deals with texts (Prose Passages / Poems) that are examined in detail in class through close questioning and group discussion. The objectives of the programme are to develop the following reading abilities required for rapid and precise understanding of written materials.

- 1. Grasping the meaning of words and phrases in contexts
- 2. Distinguishing statement of facts from beliefs, hypothesis from expression of probabilities, uncertainties etc...
- 3. Understanding the logical relationship between statements.
- 4. Inferring from information in a passage causes, reasons, general results, conclusions, opinions, specific instances and general statements.
- 5. Scanning to locate specific details skimming passages to identify general ideas and information.
- Understanding the meaning of poems. To develop the above skills of the following selected texts along with the exercises will be used.
